

<sup>\*</sup>The report card is a short follow-up on the progress and improvements that has been made since the UNC Neighborhood Study was adopted in 2004 and an indicator of infrastructure and programs still to be implemented.

<sup>\*\*</sup>In 2002, Greeley voters approved a "Quality of Life" ballot issue, which provided \$4 million for neighborhood improvements. In 2003, Community Development staff initiated the UNC Neighborhood Study in order to identify neighborhood conditions, issues and priorities. In 2004 the Greeley City Council adopted the study and approved \$713,710 for capital improvements in the UNC Neighborhood Study Area.

<sup>1</sup> After approval of the Plan by Council various other areas in the neighborhood requested streetlights. Where lights could be installed on an existing wooden pole at no cost, they were. Approximately 11 of the approved streetlights were not installed in the UNC study area. Typically, a light was not installed because a property owner would not grant an access easement for the power line. (See Attachment B – UNC Neighborhood Street Light Map).

<sup>2</sup>The 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue project was basically not done. Some additional mid-block and intersection lights were installed and the conversion to LED lights has improved the corridor. More mid-block lights could still be installed. With Councils approval, the money for lights not installed in UNC and 9<sup>th</sup> Avenue was used for other bordering neighborhoods. (See also Attachment B – UNC Neighborhood Street Light Map).

<sup>3</sup> All 6 of the approved high priority fire hydrant were installed. An additional 8 high priority fire hydrants have been installed in the intervening years. Approximately 50 fire hydrants are still needed to meet standards. (See Attachment C – UNC Neighborhood Fire Hydrant Map.)

<sup>4</sup> Due to a lack of funds not all needed sidewalks could be installed. Most missing sidewalks are around the RR crossing area like 16<sup>th</sup> & 18<sup>th</sup> Streets. The "Keep Greeley Moving" project will not be able to help in this effort since it is limited to the repair or replacement of existing concrete and access ramps. (See Attachment D – UNC Neighborhood Sidewalk and Access Ramp Map.)

<sup>5</sup> Access ramps are needed in conjunction with installation of new sidewalks and older non-ADA compliant ramps. (See Attachment D – UNC Neighborhood Sidewalk and Access Ramp Map.)

<sup>6</sup> One loan was made in the 10<sup>th</sup> Street/UNC Neighborhood area and has a  $\approx$  \$6,000 balance. (The loan was credited to the 10<sup>th</sup> Street Neighborhood Area). Due to a lack of program use the remaining money was reallocated by Council for streetlights, sidewalks, fire hydrants etc. in Minor Study areas such as Billie Martinez, E. UNC and others.

<sup>7</sup>Greeley Urban Renewal Authority (GURA) funds infrastructure improvements such as sidewalks and also provides other assistance in the area including home rehabilitation, multi-family unit assistance, the Home Again Program (homes sold), tree removal and pruning subsidy, emergency rehab support, motion detector light rebates and credit counseling services. GURA participated in the 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue Pedestrian Improvements with infrastructure such as curb, gutter and sidewalks along 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue between 10<sup>th</sup> Street and 16<sup>th</sup> Street. <sup>8</sup>Not all the old sidewalks in the area are code compliant e.g. too narrow, lifting, sinking, cracked or broken. <sup>9</sup> Will include 1.26 miles of overlay and 2.46 miles of seal coat.

<sup>10</sup> The future potable water pipe lining will be completed as the budget allows. CML is "Cement Mortar Lined" which protects and prolongs the life of pipes as well as improving flows. About 97% meet standards, about 1.7% partially meet standards and 1.7% do not meet standards. (See Attachment E – UNC Neighborhood Potable Water Line Service Map).

<sup>11</sup> The sanitary sewer pipe lining will be completed as the budget allows. In addition, there have been 40 new or replaced manholes and150 coated manholes. About 92% meet standards, about 6.5% partially meet standards and about 1% do not meet standards. (See Attachment F – *UNC Neighborhood Sanitary Sewer Service Map.*) <sup>12</sup>The Uptown Tree project is a means to aesthetically enhance 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue with a variety of original "Art Trees" in recognition of Greeley as a designated "Tree City". Uptown Trees is a project of the Greeley Art Commission and was funded through 1% for Art program.

<sup>13</sup>This figure includes the \$1.5M GURA contribution to the project. The remainder of the funds came from Greeley General Fund, Quality of Life Sales Tax and the 1% for Art Project. The project was along 8<sup>th</sup> Ave. from 16<sup>th</sup> Street to 10<sup>th</sup> Street. Improvements included new street lighting, expanded and landscaped sidewalks, street furniture including benches, trash cans, landscaping and the construction of landscaped medians.

<sup>14</sup> Examples include the residential screen wall along Hwy. 34 west of 11<sup>th</sup> Avenue, 11<sup>th</sup> Avenue entryway monumentation improvements north of Hwy. 34, Greeley Gateway South Entryway improvements at 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue and 23<sup>rd</sup> Street, neighborhood monumentation and the 8<sup>th</sup> Avenue Corridor Project that includes Uptown Trees. <sup>15</sup> Area residents were appointed to the GLIRA neighborhood citizen advisory board, but it is not always possible.

<sup>15</sup>Area residents were appointed to the GURA neighborhood citizen advisory board, but it is not always possible to retain representation from all the various target neighborhoods.

<sup>16</sup>Neighborhood Registration is coordinated by Neighborhood Resource Office and the Greeley Police Department as part of the Greeley Neighborhood Action Team (NAT). The Greeley Police Department coordinates the program for the 12 neighborhood watch groups in the UNC Neighborhood area. The Business Watch program is now part of the Shoplifter Task Force (see <sup>17</sup> below).

<sup>17</sup>Operation Safe Stay and Shoplifter Task Force is part of NAT and coordinated by Greeley Police Department.
 <sup>18</sup> Neighborhood Improvement Grants (NIG) administered by Neighborhood Resource Office.

<sup>19</sup> Code Enforcement was the #1 most important issue identified by neighbors at the neighborhood meetings and neighborhood survey. The primary concerns were property appearance (e.g. trash, weeds and sofa tree) maintenance and upkeep, and parking issues (parking on yards, too many vehicles in front of homes and the need for more parking area). The #2 issue was Police presence for traffic and crime, and #3 was noise and lighting.

<sup>20</sup>G-Hope (Greeley Home Ownership Incentive Program) is a pilot Home Ownership Program for city employees and 6 major businesses to promote more home ownership in Greeley's Redevelopment District and around the UNC campus. The 35 loans are located throughout the redevelopment district but are primarily located in the UNC and NCMC area.




18th Street at RR Tracks, Skipping Sidewalk, no crossing


