



HISTORIC PRESERVATION MONTH CELEBRATION: CENTENNIAL VILLAGE

Join us on **Sunday, May 15, from 1 to 3 p.m.**, at Centennial Village, 1475 A St., to attend a special reception hosted by the Historic Preservation program at Centennial Village in celebration of Historic Preservation Month. Learn about the City of Greeley Museum's efforts to rehabilitate and preserve structures on the 8-acre living history site. This is a free event.

GREELEY HISTORIC REGISTER

The Greeley Historic Register is a list of properties designated as historically, architecturally, and/or geographically significant to Greeley by the Greeley Historic Preservation Commission. The list includes houses, commercial buildings, historic schools, Lincoln Park and Glenmere Park, the No. 3 Ditch, the Weld County Garage Sign, Artesian Well #5, churches, POW Camp 202 Stone Gateposts, the depot, the Downtown Greeley Historic District and the Monroe Avenue Historic District.

The City Council-appointed Historic Preservation Commission began designating properties in 1996. The Commission has designated properties on the Register for significance in two of three areas of historical, architectural, and geographical significance. Designated properties are eligible to apply for financial incentives to help fund rehabilitation projects, including the City's Historic Preservation Low Interest Loan program, the State Income Tax Credit for Historic Preservation, and the refund of building permit fees.


