Eddie Trevino, Industrial Pretreatment Specialist with Greeley's Water and Sewer Department, was one of 25 environmental regulatory professionals from across the United States who were selected to attend an EPA Advanced Environmental Crimes Training Program. The two-week course in September involved training in interviewing, investigating, collecting evidence and testifying about environmental crimes. Due to Eddie's experience in Greeley's Pretreatment Program and his knowledge of Clean Water Act regulations, he was able to lead his team to be the first in four years to successfully investigate and prosecute a mock criminal case.

The Aims Community College Nursing Program class of 2016 achieved a 100 percent passing rate on the National Council Licensing Examination-RN. The national pass rate for all nursing programs is 86 percent, which places Aims students at the top of their jurisdiction and the country. The national test evaluates knowledge, skills and abilities essential for the safe and effective practice of entry level nursing.

The Colorado Association of Chiefs of Police has granted re-accreditation status to the Greeley Police Department. To become re-accredited, the Department had to meet the 214 required professional standards. Of the 246 local law enforcement agencies in Colorado, fewer than 50 currently have attained this status.
