Parks – Developed & Natural Areas

Over 40 public parks and open space areas including neighborhood parks, dog parks, skate parks, softball, and sports park complexes, including a 140-acre regional park and arena.

The Poudre River Trail is a 21-mile paved biking, walking, running and rollerblading trail. Including the Sheep Draw Trail, there are over 90 miles of bike lanes and trails.



Shopping – Fresh Fashion & Foods

Greeley offers a full spectrum of shopping opportunities; including a fully enclosed mall along with several open air shopping centers. No matter where you reside within the community you'll be in close proximity to a variety of regional and national grocery, clothing, hardware, home improvement and restaurant and entertainment offerings.



For the buy-local shopper, fresh seasonally grown produce and traditional ethnic foods are available from the Greeley Farmers' Market located downtown under the outdoor market pavilion. For the broader market regional shopper, a major outdoor lifestyle shopping center is just twenty minutes away, and for the highend international shopper, the Denver metropolitan marketplace is only an hour away.

Healthcare – High Quality Options

The health and wellbeing of Greeley is served by a medical community of physicians and caregivers in every specialty. North Colorado Medical Center, a fully-accredited, not-for-profit facility, is licensed to operate 378 beds. NCMC offers highly specialized cancer treatments, comprehensive regional heart care programs, a Level Two trauma and emergency services center, and the Monfort Family Birth Center with a Level Two neo-natal intensive care unit. NCMC also provides medical air-transport and is one of only three burn units in the state. The NCMC staff is nationally recognized for excellence in many programs such as burn and trauma care as well as hyperbaric medicine. The cancer care program is the highest-rated in Northern Colorado. The cardiac program, as well as the hospital overall, are consistently rated in the top 100 in the country and in 2015, was ranked in the top 50.

Beyond NCMC's first rate emergency services, there are several emergency care clinics in Greeley and long-term health care facilities. Greeley professionals also offer a number of alternatives for occupational health and well workplace resources.







Climate – Sunny & Dry

Greeley enjoys a semi-arid climate with hot summers and relatively mild winters. Lots of sunshine and modest precipitation makes for an ideal climate with low humidity year-round. Precipitation occurs mostly in the form of rain or snow from October to April: snowfalls are often light and usually melt within a few days.

Transportation - Local, Regional & Beyond

Denver International Airport - DIA

Greeley is located approximately 50 miles north of Denver, providing easy access to Denver International Airport within an hour's driving time. Shuttle services are available, 7 days a week from Greeley Shuttle or SuperShuttle.

Greeley-Weld County Airport

The Greeley-Weld County Airport's 10,000 foot main runway, modern terminal building and on-site aviation/jet services are capable of handling all private and business aviation needs.


Location Transportation Options
