Protecting Pollinators

- Insects are near the bottom of the food chain.
 - Helping insects will help all those species dependent upon them.
- Insect <u>biomass</u> is estimated to have declined 40% over the past 50 years.
- Insects are in trouble!
 - Bees
 - Monarchs
- Neonicotinoids

Pesticides are harmful to human health
Pesticides are ubiquitous
Pesticides linger in the environment
Pesticides are not adequately regulated
"treated article exemption"
Only test active ingredient (ai)
No precautionary principle
